CALL TO ORDER

Mayor McAleer called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M.

Mayor McAleer explained the process to be followed during the public hearings.

PUBLIC HEARING #1: ZONING CODE TEXT AMENDMENT – SECTIONS 17.42(5)(A), 17.42(5)(B) AND 17.42(5)(C) - CONDITIONAL USE REVIEW, DETERMINATION, APPROVAL, AND AMENDMENT.

APPLICANT: CITY OF DELAFIELD

MATTER: CONSIDERATION OF AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE SECTION 17.42(5)(A), AND REPEAL SECTIONS 17.42(5)(B) AND 17.42(5)(C) OF THE CITY OF DELAFIELD MUNICIPAL CODE, TO ELIMINATE THE ABILITY TO DETERMINE A MAJOR VS. MINOR CHANGE TO A CONDITIONAL USE. THIS CHANGE WILL REQUIRE ALL CONDITIONAL USE AMENDMENTS TO BE CONSIDERED VIA THE PUBLIC HEARING PROCESS.

Mayor McAleer opened the Public Hearing at 7:02 p.m.

R. Dupler noted this ordinance would provide modifications to current procedures utilized by the City for the Plan Commission to determine whether a change to a Conditional Use constituted a major or minor change. With this ordinance change, all changes to Conditional Uses would be considered a major change and a public hearing process would then be conducted each time a Conditional Use required modification.

Linda Holton, 485 Lillian Court, thanked the Commission for considering this ordinance. She thought public hearings were an asset in the governmental process as it helped to maintain balance between the public interests, Commission and Common Council. The contribution made through the public hearing process by public comment could be viewed as the only

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consistent knowledge of certain issues or properties in some cases as political representatives changed on the Common Council and on the Commission as well.

M. DEYOE MOVED TO CLOSE PUBLIC HEARING #1 AT 7:05 P.M. K. ATTWELL SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

**PUBLIC HEARING #2: CONSIDERATION OF CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT
REVOCAION OR MODIFICATION FOR THE HARTLAND SPORTSMAN'S CLUB**

APPLICANT: CITY OF DELAFIELD

MATTER: RECEIVE PUBLIC COMMENT REGARDING WHETHER THE CITY OF DELAFIELD SHOULD REVOKE OR MODIFY THE CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT ISSUED TO HARTLAND SPORTSMAN'S CLUB, INC. WHICH AUTHORIZES THE CLUB TO OPERATE A SHOOTING RANGE AT 701 MAPLE AVENUE, DELAFIELD, WI. REVOCATION OF A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT IS PERMITTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 17.44 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE WHERE USE OF THE PROPERTY HAS NOT BEEN IN CONFORMANCE WITH THE CONDITIONS OF THE CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT OR A CHANGE IN THE CHARACTER OF THE SURROUNDING AREA, OR IF THE USE ITSELF CAUSES THE USE TO BE NO LONGER COMPATIBLE WITH SURROUNDING AREAS, OR FOR SIMILAR CAUSE BASED UPON CONSIDERATIONS OF PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY OR WELFARE

Mayor McAleer opened the Public Hearing at 7:06 p.m., noting that almost all Common Council members were in the audience. He noted the different public hearing procedures process that would be utilized in this hearing as there were several presentations to be made before the Commission.

J. Hammes explained a court reporter was present for this meeting and noting hearings had been previously held on the topic. Comments made at previous hearings were part of the record and did not need to be repeated. He explained that the incident that occurred at the Delafield Brewhaus after the last public hearing prompted a need to schedule a second public hearing on the matter. The City Administrator had provided a report that summarized the specific issues at hand and were based on the City Planner's report of findings at the Hartland Sportsman's Club (HSC), as well as the City of Delafield Police report of the incident. The City Administrator's letter had been provided to the HSC for consideration and action as needed.

T. Schuenke then summarized the information found in his memorandum dated May 17, 2010 regarding the HSC Conditional Use that was included in the epacket for this meeting and can be found on the City's website. Photo depictions were shared as part of the evidence found relating to this memorandum and included actual photos showing the use of tires for backstop material, an exposed concrete culvert and exposed cobble at various ranges on site. These were considered to be part of the violations found on site and improvements to the Club were also noted within the memorandum.

R. Dupler noted that some of the issues shown in the photos were related to conduct issues rather than areas of non-compliance with the Conditional Use that governed the site.

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City of Delafield Police Officer Landon Nyren provided a report of findings associated with the shooting incident at the Delafield Brewhaus that took place on April 29, 2010 regarding a stray bullet believed to originate from the HSC. He provided diagrams that were based on witness statements and included various photographs and diagrams noting the distance the bullet traveled, location of the shooter and surrounding objects, and berm distance from the shooter. Diagrams depicting the maximum and minimum angles of trajectory were shared, noting it was possible for the gun to be tilted so that the round could have cleared the top of berm and the bottom of the awning to escape the range. It was also noted that if the shooter were a few feet ahead of the firing table the area between the top of the berm and the bottom of the awning would greatly increase and would allow a round to pass over the top of the berm out of the range area. Angles of trajectory were noted in these virtual diagrams as well.

Steve Gibbs, of Hertel & Gibbs, from Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and John Wilcox of Elm Grove, Wisconsin was present. S. Gibbs also introduced Jeff Nass, a technical team advisor that had assisted in investigating the matter.

With regard to the memorandum sent by the City Administrator to the HSC, J. Wilcox stated efforts had been made to work with the agreement for the Club required with the General Development Plan (GDP) and Site Improvement Plan (SIP). He reviewed the history of the HSC in the community and stated communications had been ongoing with City Staff regarding working through various activities required in the agreement that governed the Club. He noted changes throughout the history of the relationship with the City as some areas of the agreement were no longer considered pertinent as some of the ranges had changed and aspects of the original agreement were no longer needed.

With regard to the trash on site, S. Gibbs noted, the City Administrator had not found trash on site during his visit. He went on to explain that there were many documents being reviewed by attorneys and technical advisors regarding the incident at the range. There was a water bottle believed to have caused the round to go off the premises. While use of the water bottle had not been processed for approval, its use typically would have received HSC approval. He noted the request for the use of the water bottle would have been granted if asked; however, the bottle would have been placed closer to the berm. The round was considered to be in "perfect" condition meaning that it did not have nicks or deformities that would have occurred if it had ricocheted off another material. If the individual utilizing the range had gotten prior approval, the target would have been placed in the correct location. New shooters are briefed on safety issues and HSC rules prior to accessing the range. After the shooting incident, HSC members and individual shooters were cooperative with the City of Delafield Police Department in its investigation. Issues raised during this investigation were reviewed and recommendations made to the HSC for signage regarding targets. He stated the HSC was following its own rules.

J. Hammes clarified that the water bottle would have been on the approved list for targets and the person discharging the fire arm should have gotten approval and if that had happened, the bottle would have been situated differently. He then questioned the process to be followed when a target was requested for approval. J. Wilcox explained that process.

Jeff Nass, Certified Technical Team Advisor, stated he had conducted an investigation into the shooting incident. He noted his experience and history with fire arms. The National Rifleman's

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Association (NRA) does not have exact standards as each range required its own individual interpretation and need for safe shooting. The NRA did provide recommendations for safety in this matter. He then went on to review the recommendations and standards for the HSC with regard to each range and materials utilized for safety on each range. It was his opinion that the bullet struck the water bottle and was deflected off the bottle over the top of the berm. He complimented the City of Delafield Police Department for a great job in investigating the incident noting that it made his job easier and they had covered a great deal of information to base his report upon in this matter.

M. DeYoe thanked J. Nass for his testimony in this matter and questioned how the bullet could have escaped from the range. J. Nass stated it was his opinion as a range specialist that the bullet struck the upper shoulder of a bottle and went through that with decreased velocity that caused the angle of the shot to change and be deflected over the berm and landed at the Delafield Brewhaus. This action was considered almost impossible and extremely difficult to do. It was considered a "freak accident." The target being used was considered an approved target and was often utilized in Hunter Education classes for emphasis on safety. By placing it differently from the firing line, the angle would have been changed. A water bottle was considered a reactive target and it would be good for new shooters to see it in action in Hunter Education programs.

M. DeYoe thanked him for his opinion and noted the report included six recommendations to the HSC including the use of various materials in the range areas that required change, concerns with range distances and surroundings, and signage upgrades to enhance safety aspects of the Club.

K. Attwell questioned whether it was typical to have a range officer on site at a gun club. J. Nass stated most public ranges did not have a range officer on site at all times.

J. Hammes questioned whether a range officer would have identified these issues as problematic if on site. J. Nass stated that would have been the case, but it was also important to understand that most ranges were safe without a range officer on site at all times. Shooters should have an inexpensive range to shoot, and the HSC had great natural boundaries. To take away the ranges would give away the safety of the community. Range officers were expensive and would make the Club one that most could not afford.

M. Frede questioned J. Nass as to his professional opinion regarding compliance with the permit. J. Nass stated he could not speak to that aspect of the investigation. His job was to make recommendations for improvement to the HSC and that process had begun prior to this incident and related investigation. The range will not be open until the HSC is certain as to how to complete the improvements. While he thought some could be open, others needed improvements with the process for improvement undertaken by the Club prior to the April 29 incident.

S. Gibbs stated there was no requirement to have a range safety office on location at any time that someone was shooting. A range officer is a trained volunteer. He noted the changes to the various ranges and improvements that had been allowed since the inception of the Range Protection Act in the late 1990's. While this incident could be litigated, that was not what the HSC desired at this time. They had continued to work cooperatively with the City throughout

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time and were continuing to make efforts in being good neighbors. Concerns had been heard by the HSC and efforts undertaken so that an incident like this never happened again. Experts had been hired and NRA recommendations reviewed. He noted the working relationship with the City and stated the HSC gave its deepest sympathies to the victim. There were no criminal charges being filed in this matter as it was a case of negligent action. No range could contain all bullets all the time and people were trusted to act responsibly and safely at all times while following the rules for shooting at the Club.

J. Hammes questioned the issues associated with compliance by the HSC since its original Conditional Use Agreement in 1997. S. Gibbs stated he did not dispute that the original requirements were not met in the first year, but there were reasons why this did not occur that he thought were important to fully understand the issues at hand. J. Wilcox agreed, noting the HSC had cooperatively worked with the City and would continue to do so to be a good neighbor and provide safety in implementation of recommendations set forth by J. Nass in this matter. Ongoing work would continue and safety for all would continue to be a priority.

Jason Abrahamson, representing Raluca Buznea, stated he and his client were present this evening to let people know of the incident at the Delafield Brewhaus so that it did not happen again. While he was appreciative of the seriousness of the investigation being undertaken by the City, the incident was preventable and should have been seen by the HSC well in advance of this incident.

Mayor McAleer recessed the meeting at 8:30 p.m. and reconvened the meeting at 8:40 p.m.

Dear Mayor McAleer and Mr. Schuenke,

I would respectfully like to submit some comments regarding the ever-growing controversy about the operation of the Hartland Sportsman's Club in it's current location. As the major media interest increases, so will the knowledge base of the citizens who are concerned for the safety and happiness of the young families in this area. It is obviously a difficult time for the city government, and as more of the story becomes known by more people, it will become very clear to many that action should have been initiated by the previous mayor several year ago.

I'm sure you're well aware of these issues. But like nearly all of our friends and neighbors, we had no real information about the club until now. We live a mile from the club, and all we previously knew was that we must close our windows during the shooting (and still we could hear the sounds of gunfire).

The things we had never learned before the hearing and publicity were> that the club was closed in 2004 and 2005 due to wayward bullets, but the promised committee to investigate may have never been activated; and that there have been some attempts at noise abatement but the sound levels have recently been measured 102 decibels in the nearby community; and that shooting members can "self-supervise" their own activities;...and of course that a pregnant mother was recently shot in the abdomen while sitting at a nearby restaurant patio table. I'm sure you're well aware of the iconic effect of that case -- the "smoking gun" (and almost the "nail in the coffin" for the unborn baby).

Noted firearms expert Brad Krause authored an article last week explaining how a bullet of that type can travel 1.2 miles. That places hundreds of citizens, whether dining, shopping, or even playing with children within their own yards at risk from a careless, errant, or momentarily clownish act at any given time.

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Gentlemen, a most reasonable assumption could be that the time is well overdue for the club to move to a location that is not a threat to the community's safety and well-being. In your heart-of-hearts, the solution must seem clear. No matter what "rules" one might attempt to impose, the concept of the city assuring the safety of the the people who live, work, play, dine and shop in the area doesn't seem realistic. The actual location of the activity is it's unsustainable feature.

We know this is a very busy and stressful time, and we all thank you for your concerns about the peace and security of life in Delafield.

Gun range ordered closed in Wisconsin

WAUSAU (AP) — An appeals court has ordered a western Wisconsin gun club to shut down its shooting range after neighbors complained about bullets flying onto their properties.

The 3rd District Court of Appeals ruled Tuesday that the Central St. Croix Rod and Gun Club near Baldwin had one chance to submit a workable safety plan for the club in an agreement with the neighbors, but failed to meet that requirement.

The three-judge panel said St. Croix County Judge Eric Lundell erred in failing to issue a permanent injunction banning firearms at the 11-acre shooting range.

Dear Common Council Members-

I am writing to you today as a concerned citizen of Delafield. I would like to ask you to attend the Plan Commission Meeting on Wednesday, May 26th at 7:00pm at Christ the King Lutheran Church. There is a very serious issue in front of the Plan Commission and I feel you should be there to listen to all the facts. The issue I am writing to you about is the modification or revocation of the Hartland Sportsman's Club Conditional Use Permit. This issue affects the greater community as a whole. A group of citizens, myself included, voiced our opinions at the last Plan Commission meeting in April regarding numerous safety issues, one day later a pregnant woman was grazed by a bullet from the Hartland Sportsman's Club. This is very serious, I would like you to hear all the facts that are presented not just a condensed written version. I feel there should be immediate revocation of the permit and at the meeting we plan to have concrete examples of how this Club is a danger to our community.

Please take the time out of your busy schedule to do this, I feel it is a defining moment for Delafield. Our community strives to define itself as "Lake Country" but the shooting incident has cast a bad light on Delafield in print, radio and television. The leaders in our community need to decide what is more important - the safety of our citizens and visitors OR the hobby of a couple dozen people. Given the chance to review all the facts I feel our city officials will do the right thing and close the Club permanently before someone is seriously wounded or killed.
