E. McAleer stated if the three Fire Departments merge, they will share the financial responsibility for this contract.

G. Gresch stated all bartenders passed their background check.

J. KRICKHAHN MOVED TO APPROVE THE TWO-YEAR BARTENDER LICENSE(S). R. MISKELLEY SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

2. Class B Beer Class B Liquor License available.

G. Gresch stated the City has a Combination Class B Beer Class B Liquor License available. When this type of license becomes available, the Common Council follows the procedure established in Resolution 96-10 and Appendix A – Guidelines. There was discussion about what type of license it is; regular or reserve. It is a regular license. G. Gresch stated if a reserve license holder applies and receives the regular license, they could surrender the reserve license and that would open up another license. This process would be repeated and the City could charge \$10,000 for that license. E. McAleer asked when the City gains another license due to a population increase. G. Gresch stated a new license is gained when population increases by 500 people. L. Morrison stated the Nagawicka Lake Yacht Club has a liquor license but it is through the state since it is a sport club; it doesn't count against the City's quota. E. Sadowski asked

if a developer like Village Square could have one and hold onto it while waiting for a business to come to the property that could use it. Common Council members stated no that is not allowed.

- b. Plan Commission

There was nothing to report at this time.

- c. Lake Welfare Committee – (Minutes of December 11, 2008)
 - 1. Report on discussion and action taken at previous meetings, future agenda items and upcoming scheduled meetings.
 - 2. Discussion and action on recommendation from Lake Welfare Committee to let the dredging and restoration project for public bidding.

Lake Welfare Committee Chair Kent Attwell was present and stated the DNR approved the Chapter 30 Permit. The Lake Welfare Committee approved a request for the Common Council to authorize the City to go out for bids for the dredging. The Lake Welfare Committee has estimates and do not know what real costs are. L. Morrison stated the City will have real numbers from the bids in time for a referendum.

L. MORRISON MOVED TO APPROVE THE RECOMMENDATION FROM LAKE WELFARE COMMITTEE TO START THE DREDGING AND RESTORATION PUBLIC BIDDING. G. MACDOUGALL SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

K. Attwell stated the Lake Welfare Committee wrote referendum language and did so with two questions. One question is for those directly affected by the dredging; the other question is for the general population. R. Miskelley stated he likes the way the questions were broken out and congratulated the committee for doing that. G. MacDougall asked if each resident on the lake will be told what their costs will be before the referendum takes place and that Alderperson Beth Leonard is very concerned about that. J. Krickhahn asked if there is a plan for the possibility of one question passing and the other failing. K. Attwell stated yes there is a backup plan. E. Sadowski asked if the costs from question two could be a part of question one. K. Attwell stated that was discussed at the Lake Welfare Committee meeting and it was determined that mixing the two questions would be too confusing. R. Miskelley stated people need to know long before the April Election what its going to cost them.

K. Attwell stated the City Attorney reviewed the language and is now up to the Common Council to approve the language. E. McAleer stated the verbiage about it costing \$7 per \$100,000 of assessed value is not clear to the regular voter. L. Morrison stated the Lake Welfare Committee knows that there will be a lot of work involved to get this information out to the people so the project is passed by the voters. She stated people don't understand the specifics of this project and that the payment is spread out over 10 years. The positive side to this project is that the people that will be hired to do the work could be hungry for work and could bring in lower costs. K. Attwell stated the Lake Welfare Committee wants it very clear to everyone that they will know what it will cost them when they go into the voting booth. L. Morrison stated flyers and brochures will be sent out. She used the parks as an example of a City maintained operation that not everyone uses and that it only costs each property owner \$9.00 per \$1,000 of assessed value. G. MacDougall asked if there are any beneficiaries that don't want to benefit from the dredging. L. Morrison stated they are not that far into the process yet, but maybe someone that is on an end that doesn't affect their neighbors could opt out, but no one that could affect their neighbors can opt out. K. Attwell stated the biggest cost is the fuel

to run the pump and fuel prices are down. The Common Council has until the February Common Council meetings to adopt a resolution for referendum language.

d. Park and Recreation Commission

e. Public Works Committee – (Minutes of December 3, 2008)

1. Report on discussion and action taken at previous meetings, future agenda items and upcoming scheduled meetings.

R. Miskelley stated the Public Works Committee was asked to review the site plans for the new city buildings. The committee realized there is a utility pole in a bad spot at the Downtown Civic Center that would cost about \$22,000 to remove or replace. For now, staff will review how to resolve that and if needed, the Public Works Committee will review further. The committee also reviewed the downtown directional signage. The committee believes they can be put up, but they should be lower than any stop sign and be installed 6" to the right of the stop sign. G. MacDougall read in the minutes about street lighting at the Public Safety building. R. Miskelley stated he cannot answer that as he was not at the meeting. T. Hafner stated the Public Works Committee recommends about seven additional light poles. He agrees it would be a good idea and realize it's a tight budget. The City has about 25 poles in inventory but there is still the cost of wiring and conduit. The City probably doesn't have the budget to do it during construction, but it could be pursued in the next couple of years. E. McAleer stated he would like to hear from the residents across the street from the Public Safety Campus before any additional lighting is installed.

L. Morrison stated the Committee is still working on the strategic planning and hopes to have a presentation to the Common Council early next year.

E. Sadowski stated the Committee has had a productive December. The committee sent commitment letters to groups and organizations along with fundraising letters for money, prizes and volunteers. The celebration will have two live bands, a movie night, caterers are being interviewed and fireworks will be on July 4. The website should be up in early 2009. They are also working with the Chamber on advertising and will have something up on the City's website and TV Channel 25.

- n. Lake Country Fire Department Expansion Committee Meeting

There was nothing to report at this time.

5. Old Business

- a. Discussion and action to approve the revised Yaggy Colby contract payment amount to do hydraulic modeling and mapping required to submit a Letter of Map Revision pertaining to the Floodplain.

M. Court stated he is requesting more money for the floodplain survey because Waukesha County is contributing less than we planned. It was originally going to be split four ways between Waukesha County, Hartland, Delafield and the Upper Nemahbin Lake District, \$10,000 each. Waukesha County will only commit to \$5,000 so that increases the other portions to \$11,667. We have received commitment letters from all parties. L. Morrison stated she has received calls from constituents that they are getting letters from their mortgage company about needing flood insurance, which is dated November 27, eight days after the DNR's deadline for the City to adopt the floodplain maps.

G. MACDOUGALL SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

- b. Discussion and action on an offer to purchase property from the Delafield-Hartland Water Pollution Control Commission

R. Miskelley stated the Common Council went into closed session earlier tonight to discuss purchasing the approximately 6.3 acres from the Del-Hart Commission for DPW cold storage.

R. MISKELLEY MOVED TO APPROVE THE OFFER TO PURCHASE APPROXIMATELY 6.3 ACRES PROPERTY FROM THE DELAFIELD-HARTLAND WATER POLLUTION CONTROL COMMISSION FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS EXPANSION AT THE APPRAISED VALUE AT \$500,000 AND TO AMEND THE 2009 CAPITAL BUDGET FOR THE SAME. E. SADOWSKI SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

6. Mayor's Report

7. New Business

- a. Discussion and action to approve the introduction of Resolution No. 2008-42, A Resolution Declaring Intent to Vacate a Portion of Genesee Street, in the City of Delafield, Waukesha County, Wisconsin, and set public hearing date and time for the same.

Common Council members asked for clarification on what is being vacated. M. Court stated the City is cleaning up the Downtown Civic Center boundary lines by taking the triangular piece or right of way, vacating it so that it becomes a part of the Civic Center building. The next step is to approve the introduction of the resolution and set the public hearing date. This vacation doesn't impact anyone else's land, only City property.

E. SADOWSKI MOVED TO APPROVE THE INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION NO. 2008-42, A RESOLUTION DECLARING INTENT TO VACATE A PORTION OF GENESEE STREET, IN THE CITY OF DELAFIELD, WAUKESHA COUNTY, WISCONSIN, AND SET PUBLIC HEARING DATE AND TIME FOR MONDAY, JANUARY 5, 2009 AT 7:00 P.M. J. KRICKHAHN SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

- b. Discussion and action to ratify the Public Works Collective Bargaining Agreement.

T. Schuenke stated we have a Public Works Union contract that expires December 31, 2008. He and the union have been negotiating over the last few months and have reached an agreement, which the union has ratified. The terms and changes to the agreement are as follows: Wages 2009 3.0% increase; 2010 3.4% increase; 2011 3.0% increase; 2012 3.4% increase; Foreman Salary 2009 Set at 10% above top laborer salary; 2011 Set at 12.5% above to laborer salary; Health Insurance 2009 10% employee contribution; 2010 11% employee contribution; 2011 11% employee contribution; 2012 12% employee contribution; Grievance Procedure Modified to eliminate the 4th step which required that a grievance not settled in the prior 3 steps be presented to the City Council for disposition prior to taking to arbitration. Hours of Work and Overtime memorialized the summer schedule we have used for the last 6 years. Prior contracts had this as a memorandum of understanding. Funeral Leave Added step relationships as part of immediate family. Also added one day of funeral leave for the death of an in-law. Uniform/Clothing Allowance increased by \$25 in 2009 and \$25 in 2011. Safety equipment increased prescription safety glasses by \$50. No changes to vacation, holidays or sick leave. The economics of this package result in an approximate 3% annual increase in the

employee's wages. This is so as the larger wage increases in the 2nd and 4th year of the agreement are offset by an increase in the amount of money the employees will contribute toward their health insurance in the 2nd and 4th year. If health insurance rates increase by an average of 7% per year the net result of this agreement would be an increase of 3% per year in the employee's wages. If health insurance costs increase by more than 7% per year, then the wage increase would average out to less than 3%. We also agreed to set the foreman's salary at 10% above the salary of the highest laborer salary in 2009 and 12.5% in 2011. The current difference is 4.8%. A spread of 10-15% is typical, so we are currently low in this regard. There are two foremen in the department. This adjustment also reflects the fact that in 2006 we had one foreman and one superintendent, but, when the superintendent left, we did not fill the superintendent position. Rather, we appointed a second foreman and parceled out the superintendent's duties between them. At that time the superintendent was paid 13.4% more than the foreman position and 18.7% higher than the highest laborer position. No additional salary was paid to the two foremen at the time of the change. The summer schedule is the schedule we have been on for the last 6 years. All employees work a 40 hour week, but they do so by working 10 hour days. Half of the employees work Monday through Thursday and half work Tuesday through Friday. Director Hafner reports the schedule works well. This agreement is a good one and asks that the Common Council ratify it.

E. SADOWSKI MOVED TO RATIFY THE PUBLIC WORKS COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT. L. MORRISON SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

G. MacDougall asked about funeral leave for anyone else that someone may be close to. T. Schuenke stated employees also have two personal days that that could be used for. Also he is still negotiating with the Police Department and they are meeting this Thursday. He hopes to have that before the Common Council in January.

- c. Discussion and action to adopt the updated City of Delafield Laptop Computer Use Policy.

G. MacDougall asked about verbiage about reading Common Council member email. He suggested there be a checks and balances and not just one person be allowed to do that. R. Miskelley stated it should spell out who the authorized representative is. E. Sadowski stated there should be two authorized representatives. E. McAleer suggested the Administrator and Deputy Clerk-Treasurer, who also takes care of the City's HR needs.

J. KRICKHAHN MOVED TO ADOPT THE UPDATED CITY OF DELAFIELD LAPTOP COMPUTER USE POLICY AND ADD VERBIAGE TO AUTHORIZE THE ADMINISTRATOR AND DEPUTY CLERK-TREASURER TO READ COMMON COUNCIL EMAILS IF THE NEED ARISES. E. SADOWSKI SECONDED THE MOTION. THERE WAS NO FURTHER DISCUSSION. ALL WERE IN FAVOR. MOTION CARRIED.

T. Schuenke stated he has no report.

G. Gresch stated anyone interested in running for local office can pickup candidates packets anytime in the City or County Clerk's Office or download them from the City or Governmental Accountability Board's website. Nomination papers are due by Tuesday, January 6, 2009 by 5:00 P.M. in the City Clerk's Office. Candidates not seeking re-

election must file their Notification of Noncandidacy form (EB-163) with the Clerk by December 26, 2008.

The December Communicator is tentatively scheduled to be mailed on December 19, 2008.

Per the City of Delafield Municipal Code, all dog owners must license their dogs. Included in the newsletter is an application for a dog license. The dog license application can also be downloaded from the City's website. Dog licenses expire on December 31st. Fees are \$12.00 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$15.00 for un-spayed or un-neutered dogs. Puppies should be licensed once they reach five months of age and have received a rabies vaccination. The deadline to renew your dog license is April 1st. After that date, a \$5.00 late penalty will be added to the above fees. To receive your dog license by mail, please send the application and appropriate fees to City Hall, 500 Genesee Street, Delafield, WI 53018. If your dog's rabies vaccination expired in 2008, proof of current rabies vaccine must be included with your application. Please call City Hall at 646-6220 if you no longer own a dog.

Property Taxes were mailed today. If you do not receive yours by Monday, December 22, 2008, please call the Clerk's Office. The staff can look up your payment online for you. Also, the 2009 Tax Rate Sheet is on the City's website under "What's New". This sheet includes information about tax rates, school districts and making your property tax payment. Also property taxes can be viewed online http://dwprd.waukeshacounty.gov/applications/production/ROD_TAX_LISTING/.

The City of Delafield will be accepting credit cards (VISA, MasterCard, Discover and American Express) for utility bill payments, parking/moving citations, warrants and ordinance violations. There is a charge for this service that the USER pays as a convenience fee. The fees are as follows: Utility Payments will cost the user \$5.95 for payments up to \$500; Parking/Moving Citations will cost the user \$3.00 for payments up to \$200; Warrants will cost the user \$55.00 for payments up to \$2,200; Ordinance Violations will cost the user \$55.00 for payments up to \$2,200. You can make a payment with your credit card by calling 1-800-272-9829 (when prompted, enter code 7100) or pay online. To pay online, go to www.cityofdelafield.com and click "Pay Fees by Credit Card" under the Fast Links section. This link will take you to the Official Payments website where it will prompt you to choose your State, your municipality and the type of payment you want to make. Follow the prompts on the pages to process your payment. Credit card payments should be live tomorrow.

G. MacDougall asked about the credit card convenience fees and to whose convenience is that for? It doesn't seem like a convenience to pay an extra \$6 to pay your utility bill. G. Gresch stated the City is offering another way for people to make payments and that the City doesn't make any money or pay anything for this service. Also, last year 15 people paid their property taxes with their credit card. Some people use their credit card for points or miles and don't mind paying the fee.

Also, the City Hall / Administration Offices and Library will be closed December 24, 25, 31 and January 1 for the holidays.

E. McAleer stated the next Common Council is January 5, 2009. J. Krickhahn stated he has spent the last couple of weeks going door to door getting nomination signatures and wanted to share what he has been hearing. He has heard good things and that we should look at how far we've come in a year. The Common Council has faced tragedy, catastrophe and a new administration. People are saying this is the best Common Council they've seen in a very long
